MEETING MINUTES

1. <u>Call to Order/Introductions</u> Chair Otto called the meeting to order at 9:36 am and led the group in introductions.

2. <u>Approval of the Agenda</u>

Mr. Kirton made a motion to approve the meeting agenda, Ms. Walsh supported the motion, motion approved.

3. <u>Approval of Minutes</u> Ms. Wessler made a motion to approve the March 3, 2021 minutes as corrected, Mr. Kirton supported the motion, motion approved.

4. <u>Public Participation</u>

Mr. Mogensen asked staff and committee members to continue encouraging more meaningful public engagement at meetings.

5. <u>Communications and Announcements</u>

Mr. Sapkiewicz provided the following updates:

- Reminder to obligate projects quickly. The obligation authority for the rural program is at 75% obligated and the non-rural program is at 82.3% obligated.
- The 2023-2026 TIP development is kicking off. WATS staff are working with SEMCOG to collaborate on the public participation process.
- The County's new Opportunity Index has been released.
- WATS, the City of Ypsilanti, and St. Joe's are partnering on a tactical urbanism project in the City of Ypsilanti. Public input meetings will be held later this month. WATS will also be partnering with the City of Chelsea on another tactical urbanism project in the Fall.
- The RTA has initiated their regional call for 5310 projects. WATS is participating in the project scoring committee.

6. <u>Old Business</u>

No old business.

7. <u>New Business</u>

A. HIP Covid Funding Strategy - Action

Mr. Buck explained that the Policy Committee has requested a recommendation from the Technical Committee on a process to allocate additional HIP Covid-Relief funds. These funds represent a significant influx of funding to the county, have special eligibilities, and do not require a local match. The Policy Committee showed support for the ReImagine Washtenaw

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vision. Mr. Buck met with local partners at the County, AAATA, WCRC, and MDOT to identify if there was a project along Washtenaw Ave that could be sponsored by an Act-51 agency and would be able to obligate funding by FY 2024, as is required for these special funds. These discussions determined that ongoing plans for the midblock crossing/super stop, and sidewalk infill projects would not be able to move forward on time. Mr. Buck also provided the committee with a review of the current scoring process for project applications.

Discussion ensued regarding the purpose of these funds as Covid relief, and how to best prioritize projects that will directly address issues related to Covid. Discussion included the following points:

- The cost of materials and labor has increased significantly due to Covid, which has increased the funding needed for existing projects in the TIP.
- Cities and townships will receive Covid relief funding for non-infrastructure projects and transit has received relief funding through the CARES Act, while the WCRC has not received Covid relief funding.
- The existing WATS process for project scoring should be tweaked to include a flag for low/very low opportunity areas according to the County's new Opportunity Index and to include a flag for projects with special Covid eligibility.
- A supplemental call for 2023-2026 TIP projects should allow local agencies to submit an application for both existing and new projects.
- A supplemental call for projects should go through the FAC, Technical, and Policy committees for approval.

Mr. Pratt made a motion to recommend the Policy Committee to direct staff to make a supplemental call for FY 2022 and FY 2023 of the FY 2020-2023 TIP. All submittals will be flagged to indicate whether or not the project is included in a low or very low opportunity area. Applications will also indicate whether or not the project is being submitted under the special eligibilities of the HIP-COVID funds, supported by Mr. Voght, motion approved unanimously.

8. Agency Reports

A. <u>City of Ypsilanti</u>

Ms. Wessler reported:

- Going out to bid this month for local roads projects with county road millage.
- B. <u>City of Ann Arbor</u>

Mr. Hess reported:

- The City's Vision Zero transportation plan update will go to city council for approval in June.
- The Healthy Streets program was not approved for this year.

C. <u>City of Saline</u>

Mr. Fordice reported:

• Several local street projects went out for rebid and came in significantly lower

than last year.

D. Washtenaw County Road Commission (WCRC)

Mr. MacDonell reported:

• Federal funds programmed this year for pavements is \$3.6M for rural and urban areas and over for non-motorized is \$4.5M programmed in TAP.

E. <u>TheRide</u>

Ms. Thompson reported:

- Full service restoration is scheduled for August.
- Vaccine shuttle to EMU available.
- 2045 Long Range Plan will begin soon and will be completed in Spring 2022.

F. MDOT University Region

Mr. Davis reported:

- FY21 Cross St resurfacing project is out for bid with a goal of Fall construction
- Continuing to move forward on the Huron/Hamilton road diet project. Public meetings will be held this summer.

Ms. Martin reported:

• There will be an environmental linkages study for the M-14 / Barton Dr. interchange. MDOT is currently working on the scope of services and plan to hire a consultant by the end of the year.

G. Environmental Representative

Mr. Pratt asked committee members to support and ask their elected officials to support using funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) for rural street crossings.

H. City of Milan

Mr. Kirton reported:

• Gearing up for the FY 2021 small urban project on Platt Rd between Main and Redman.

I. <u>WAVE</u>

Ms. Roberts reported:

- The WAVE is offering free shuttles to the mass vaccination site at Pierce Lake Elementary in Chelsea.
- Planning for community engagement in the summer with the RTA.
- Pilot projects include Mobility as a Service platform, autonomous wheelchair securement, and working with an online booking platform (Ride at 50+) to help digitally reach out to older adults and sponsored by AARP.
- Board gearing up for their first retreat, which will include diversity, equity, and inclusion programming,

Re: 3rd Call for FY 2021 TIP Amendments for 2020-2023 TIP

Background

WATS initiated the 2nd call for FY 2021 TIP amendments on December 14, 2020. Notice was placed on the WATS homepage, WATS social media pages (Facebook and Twitter). Amendments were received from Ann Arbor, MDOT and Washtenaw County Road Commission.

Significant changes in this TIP amendment include:

- University of Michigan
 - FY 2021
 - Addition of a FAST Act grant in the amount of \$9,950,099 for a total project cost of \$19,906,683.
 - Install Connected Vehicle communication devices and detection sensors at 21 intersections in Ann Arbor. Additionally, deploy a fleet of 200 vehicles with C-V2X onboard units.
- People's Express
 - FY 2021
 - Deleting duplicate transit operating projects, in the amount of \$90,000 and \$190,953
- Western Washtenaw Area Value Express
 - **FY 2022**
 - Adding replacement vehicle in the amount \$275,000
 - Adding new equipment in the amount of \$50,000
 - Adding COVID Relief Funds for transit operating in the amount of \$81,204, directly allocated to the Chelsea Small Urban area

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• Ann Arbor

- FY 2021
 - Added local funds to the FY 2021 Plymouth Rd project in the amount of \$1,189,643
- FY 2022
 - Addition of federal repurposed earmark funds for the Treeline Trail planning study in the amount of \$237,500

• Washtenaw County Road Commission

- FY 2022
 - North Territorial at Pontiac Trail roundabout project became a standalone project, added State D funds in the amount of \$94,000 and local funds increased to \$623,650.
- FY 2023
 - Adding TAP grant for \$1,017,625 for the State Rd. shared use pathway project in partnership with Pittsfield Charter Township.
- Ypsilanti and MDOT
 - FY 2022
 - Adding TAP grant for \$160,000 for the Huron/Hamilton road diet enhancement project to include: green paint, new ADA compliant crosswalks, and bike lane separation

New investments total to 2020-2023 TIP=\$ 23,487,755

Environmental Justice Review

The Environmental Justice (EJ) review evaluates the fair distribution of environmental benefits and burdens in EJ and non-EJ areas. In addition, the EJ review evaluates each project for adverse social, economic, and environmental effects. More information on the USDOT EJ strategy is available <u>here</u>.

Total Investment in the TIP

Over the course of the TIP, investment made in Washtenaw County is affected by amendments and modifications (grant awards, cost changes, new projects). These changes continually affect the value of the TIP, and the amount of investment in EJ areas. The 2020-2023 TIP is currently valued at: \$593,003,996.

To quantify investment within EJ areas, WATS analyzes Census block groups by their combined percentages of minority and low-income residents to identify areas that fall within the 80th and 90th percentile. TIP projects located within these EJ areas, or within 0.5 mile of these areas, are measured in a GIS overlay analysis by the total cost of projects. For projects with a portion of investment in these areas, the segment cost was calculated as follows:

(Segment Length / Total Project Length) * Total Project Cost

Transit Investment



WATS does not anticipate the TIP amendments will have a disproportionately negative impact on EJ areas.

Opportunity Evaluation

WATS' opportunity evaluation uses the <u>county's Opportunity Index</u> to measure TIP investment within areas of low economic mobility. WATS measures investment in areas identified as "low access to opportunity" and "very low access to opportunity".

For projects with a portion of investment in these areas, the segment cost was calculated as follows:

(Segment Length / Total Project Length) * Total Project Cost

Transit Investment

Transit projects are considered to be an additional benefit to low opportunity areas by improving access and mobility. Transit investments are included in the opportunity evaluation analysis, but are not mapped.

In April 2021, Washtenaw County's Office of Community and Economic Development (OCED) released the new 2020 Opportunity Index. This tool builds off the original 2015 Index, with key


updates to the five indicators. Changes to the new Index have decreased the square miles classified as Low or Very Low from 479 sq miles to 184 sq miles. This significant change in the geography of what is classified as Low or Very Low Access to Opportunity has resulted in a significant decrease in the investment amount and percent of TIP investment reported in these areas. WATS staff believe these changes more accurately reflect real conditions in Washtenaw County.





Tracking TIP Investment in Equity Areas

By monitoring investment in EJ and low opportunity areas, WATS Committees can evaluate if enough investment is being made to balance environmental benefits and burdens and to disrupt the effects of historic injustice Throughout the course of 2020-2023 TIP amendments, TIP investment has increased from \$381M to \$593M. Investment in EJ areas has increased from \$58M to \$102M, and the percent of the total TIP value for EJ areas has increased from 15% to 17%. Current investment in low and very low opportunity areas is \$50M, or 8% of the total TIP value. As noted above, the geography of what is classified as low or very low access to opportunity has changed significantly with the release of the new 2020 Opportunity Index tool. WATS staff will use the newly defined low and very low opportunity areas to track investments moving forward.

 - Description Reconstruct road; add roundabouts, bike lanes, ped crossing; watermain and storm utility work
 - \$2,000,000 federal funds and \$4,500,000 local funds
 - Total project cost = \$6,500,000

• FY 2026 - Add Nixon Road Improvement Phase 2

- Limits Bluett to Dhu Varren
- Description Reconstruct road; add roundabouts, bike lanes, ped crossing; watermain and storm utility work
- \$3,600,000 federal funds and \$2,600,000 local funds
- Total project cost = \$6,200,000
